

### OUR NOVEMBER GATHERING

On November 19th our Guild met at Doelger Center for a very pleasant occasion, to start the holiday season and to see/hear the presentation of "PICTURE OUR PAST", a narrated slide show of the hilstory of Daly City.

The show was the same as presented to the Black Tie Dinner attendees on October 4th last, which gala event was held at the nearby Lake Merced Golf and Country LClub (just over the fence from Doelger Center). Actually, it was a bit different, since the first presentation involved



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a taped narration, synchronized with the slides, 15 minutes long.

But, for the History Guild, who have the luxury of a few more minutes, the narration by Ken Gillespie was live, and with plenty of opportunity for viewers to ask questions, get a slide shown again, and amplify on the contents.

Especially lively in his comments was Lyle Ingersoll, long-time Daly City resident, who had worked with many of the personalities shown in the pictures. He especially recalled his working with John Marchbanks. When asked what some of his duties had been, Lyle replied that he had been in the "balancing business." Knowing that he is a skilled building contractor, we were a bit puzzled, but Lyle cleared the mystery by continuing, "I balanced Marchbank's roulette wheels!"

There was a good turnout for our sixth program of the year, and we were pleased to see our Daly City official family out in almost 100% form, with Mayor Tony Giammona, and Councilfolks Jim Tucker, Jane Powell and Al Teglia. #### THE JOHN DALY HOUSE

On the corner of 21st and Guerrero Sts. in San Francisco, is an imposing mansion, built by/for John Daly in 1895.

We've been trying to sort out records of when Daly actually built the house, since all accounts indicate that he moved his family into San Francisco in 1885, with a motive of finding better schooling for his children.

City maps show that in 1885 the lot in question was conveyed to Lillie Daly, wife of John, but descriptions of the Victorian in architectural journals list the building date as 1895. In fact, the house currently flies a large pennant, probably presented by a Victorian house preservation group, with the inscription Daly-1895.

The lot immediately west of the mansion was purchased, and another, more modest home was built, used by other Daly family members.

It's well worth a trip into San Francisco to see the home where the benefactor of our city lived, with beautiful stained glass on the north side, impressive reception hall, and graceful stairways to the upper floors. We peered in through the front door glass panels, and thought of the kindly dairy farmer, who now could walk to his Milk Association offices a few blocks away on Valencia Street.

The fire in 1906 came within a block of 21st and Guerrero, but the imposing Queen Anne Victorian was untouched.

Subdivided into four apartments, or perhaps more (we just counted the mailboxes), it continues to be an imposing edifice.

#### LOOKING FORWARD IN THE NEW YEAR

Our Program Chairperson, Belva Carroll certainly has her act together! This dynamic little lady, our representative from Daly City's History, Arts & Science Commission, has us programmed through the September, 1987 meeting.

## Junipero Serra Hospital Gone

On the move again is the former Junipero Serra Hospital, which for many years was our local medical facility. First located in 1936 at what was then Briggs and Pierce in unincorporated Colma (just east of the now Texaco station at Sullivan and Pierce), it provided 16 beds for the burgeoning population of Broadmoor and Westlake. It was moved when Hwy. 280 was built, over to Hill St. in Colma, off San Pedro.

The latest move was necessitated by the BART turnaround project. It is now located on Mission St., just south of Wendy's, near Market St. in Colma.

We have vivid memories of rushing injured children and family members to the kindly ministrations of Dr. Drees and his small staff.

Also, have you noted that Serramonte Blvd. is being extended east to Hillside Blvd., from El Camino.

## 1906 REFUGEE HOUSES IN S.F.

Right behind the Army Museum in SF's Presidio, are two little houses, which were part of some 6,000 built to house refugees after the earthquake and fire in 1906.

Reconditioned by the Army, after being found in the Sunset District, they are representative of what was brought out to Daly City by H.H. Smith and other building or drayage contractors, and which provided the basis for the growth

of what turned to be our city, Daly City!

Inside the cottages are many photos of their locations throughout San Francisco, in parks, on vacant lots. The buildings provided much needed shelter for those who'd lost their homes.

Throughout Daly City, you can find these little houses, tucked in behind other structures, altered, but with that significant original look.
