PRESIDIO HISTORY FEATURED AT MARCH 18TH GATHERING


Driving through the Presidio always evokes great memories of my San Francisco childhood, digging out wonderful bullets from the backstops of the rifle ranges at the Presidio.

Our March meeting will feature Col. Milton Halsey, Executive Director of the Fort Point and Army Museum Association, bringing us the story of the Presidio of San Francisco, a landmark of our area.

Col. Halsey retired from the Army after 30 years active service, a decorated combat infantryman in Korea and Vietnam. An Army "brat", Col. Halsey was surrounded with military history all his life, and after leaving the Army has written numerous published articles on western military history.


He is a member of the Council on America's Military Past, the Civil War Roundtable, a volunteer lecturer with the National Park Service, and actively directing the Fort Point and Army Museum Association in the Presidio.

HISTORY GUILD of DALY CITY/COLMA

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THE PRESIDIO about the end of the 1700's, on the area near the present parade grounds.

Walls 14' high and 5' thick surrounded buildings which were never threatened by an enemy.

Off in the distance center can be seen the Castillo (fort) de San Joaquin, where Fort Point is now located.

CATALOGUING PROJECT

Our Library Liaison chairman, Neil Fahy, reports good progress for the Guild project of identifying and cataloguing the myriad photographs, letters, journals and other artifacts in the Samuel Chandler Historical Collection at the Serramonte Library.

Neil and Claire Fahy, and Ken Gillespie met at the Library in January with Daly City Librarian John Sullivan and City Hall rep Mike Wilson to initimeans of launching the project.

Mr. Wilson, during the summertime of 1986, had made enormous strides in the cataloguing with a self-designed system, most comprehensive and forward-looking. The discussion at the meeting turned then to the feasible methods of transferring the work already accomplished into a system of computer input and availability.

Mr. Fahy volunteered to investigate the computer software and requisite hardware needed to assimilate the work already accomplished with the data base needed for comprehensive cross-referencing.

This might include identification of a photo (or series of pix) where the searcher is looking for all

those pictures, for example, showing schoolchildren, 1910 or before, in a particular location.

A report on the project is forthcoming, and the Guild is looking for volunteers in the future for the task of corroborating those items already catalogued, and inputting to a new system when (and if) the computer hardware and software becomes avail able. OCEAN SHORE RAILROAD TRESTLES

Having read the fine book,
The Last Whistle, the story of the
Ocean Shore Railroad, our appetite is
whetted for more, detailed information
of the exact route that the railroad
took through what is now Daly City,
Broadmoor and over to the coastline,
where it went down along the cliffs
towards the communities along the
shoreline.


With a slogan of "Reaches" the Beaches", the railroad had a rocky

life of 15 years, hoping at first to link Santa Cruz from San Francisco, but never making it, because of most difficult grade and terrain problems.

By 1921 the rolling stock was sold and the track removed, and only vestiges remain (some station buildings, roadbed highlights, etc.) of the optimistic railroad with the cheerful slogan.

The book tells of the station at 12th and Mission Sts., routing along or near Potrero Ave. to San Jose and Alemany, following Alemany to a point where BART Daly City is now, across the lands of the Lake Merced Golf and Country Club, through what is part of Broadmoor, then over what we remember in the mid-'50's as "the hump" on Southgate in Westlake, by Our Lady of Mercy and up to what we remember as the Silver Saddle at Alemany (now John Daly Blvd.) and Skyline, and following the coast road down the hill.

There were three trestles in the area, one described as milepost 8.05, the other as 8.85, the third 9.10. Anybody able to tell just where those were? Tell us about it at the March 18th meeting, okay?
