She initiated the project some 25 years ago, and continues to update her statistics as new data continue to appear.


In charge of the San Francisco Room of the San Francisco Public Library, Ms. Hansen's collection of antiques, photographs, books, newspapers and artifacts relating to San Franciscana is enviable.

She is a veritable storehouse of knowledge about San Francisco, "called on by everyone imaginable... the uncommonly curious...students, researchers..."

Much of the information (facts and figures) which her patrons seek from her has been published in "The San Francisco Almanac", first published in 1975, revised in 1980, and, as she says, "It's time for another."

Emperor Norton is not a favorite of hers, she avers, and she maintains that Lillie Hitchcock Coit associated with firemen because, "the volunteer fire department was where the eligible bachelors were. If I'd been in the city at that time, I would have been chasing them, too!"


Special interest attendees at the meeting were Mayor Harold Donahue

## HOLY CROSS MARKS 100TH!

This picture of the Mt. Olivet funeral car #2 reminds us that Holy Cross Cemetery is marking its 100th anniversary this year, being the very first burial grounds in the entire Colma area.

Several Colma cemeteries were served by such cars, which brought funeral parties from San Francisco to Olivet, Cypress Lawn, and a siding to Holy Cross. Service started in 1903-1904, and continued til 1921, when hearse deliveries became more common, and business dropped off.

In 1886 Darius Ogden Mills deeded three large lots in Rancho Buri-Buri to then Archbishop Hanna, forming the bulk of Holy Cross Cemetery.

Most of the original occupants were removed from Calvary Cemetery in San Francisco, northeast of Lone Mountain.

In 1937, when the S.F. Board of Supervisors demanded evacuation of the cemeteries there, the action was upheld by a referendum vote.

It took eleven years to complete the removal, from Calvary and Laurel Laurel Hill, the Odd Fellows Cemetery and other burial grounds, to various Colma locations.

A big problem was the disposition of thousands of headstones, many of which were used to form the base for the breakwater of the St. Francis Yacht Club.

#### CATALOGUING PROGRESS

Our Cataloguing Crew is getting along most famously, not only with each other, but with the project!

Regular attendees at the Friday 1 p.m. gatherings at Serramonte Library have been: Yolanda Hardiman, Bianca Caserza, John Palmer, Elaine and Walter Riney, Ed and Olive Smith, Ken and Bunny Gillespie and Chairman Neil Fahy.

We estimate that probably 85% of the photographs have been catalogued, each exhibit listed and described in as much detail as a consensus of the viewers can achieve.

The great part of this project is the discovery of details that help close gaps in descriptions made on previous listings.

For instance, we've seen prints of Mayor H.H. Smith at a function in the 1930's. Nobody could pinpoint the activity until we found an envelope with smaller, unmounted prints. On the back of one we found what was going on, the dedication of the Pump House!

When the remaining pictures have been catalogued, the next step will be verification and filing, prior to establishing a data base for the computer input. That's sometime in the future, however.

#### SMCHA ANNUAL MEETING

The Annual Meeting of the San Mateo County Historical Association was held on June 14th last in the newly-restored Old Courthouse in Redwood City.
