BIRTHDAY PARTY AT COLMA TOWN HALL ON SUNDAY, JAN. 21ST

Members of the Guild should gird up for Sunday afternoon, January 21st, 2 to 4 p.m., for the ANNUAL MEMBERS' PARTY, held, as usual, at Colma Town Hall at the corner of Serramonte Boulevard and El Camino Real in Colma.

Celebrating the 8th Birthday of the Guild, the afternoon gathering will feature special refreshments (including the bubbly), a fine, local speaker, Elio Fontana, of V. Fontana and Co., monument makers, lots of fun and fellowship, and ...no conflict with the SuperBowl!

This is the members' party, but guests of members who wish to attend may join at the door. Our dues rates are very modest, as you know.

Elio Fontana represents the 5th of six generations in the family business, which stems from his great-great grandfather in Italy's Amilia province, the home of much of the world's fine marble. Mr. Fontana will trace the work of monument and ornamental stone as he has seen it change over the years. He is a veteran of public service, with a list of credits that is truly monumental, much of it connected with local education.

EARTHQUAKE SHACKS A HIT!

Less than a month after the October 17th earthquake the Guild's November meeting at Doelger Center featured a very comprehensive presentation on the history of the Barthquake Shacks of San Francisco", by the founder of the society for their preservation, Jane Cryan.

Ms. Cryan and her co-investigators have discovered 60½ shacks in San Francisco, and she even lived in a Sunset District gem for a period time. This residence piqued her curiosity about the little houses and started her on the way to further, city-wide investigation.

A very appreciative audience of 108 members and friends enjoyed beautiful

slides of sample homes, inside and out, with the depicting details of what made an earthquake shack, and what didn't. Some 5,600 temporary homes were built and used in San Francisco. Most were razed within a year and a half after the 1906 disaster; many were brought out to become the top-of-the-hill occupants in the early days of what would become Daly City Search continues in our area for remaining units, and many that we'd thought were survivors have turned out to be close, but no cigars.

Especially helpful in the search has been Russ Brabec, who supplied a score of likely candidates in Daly City, which Jane Cryan investigated. There are a few which meet the exterior criteria, but we'll have to catch their owners at home to check further. Members of the Guild are encouraged to supply locations, if any, for further look-see.

Special guests at the meeting were Daly City Councilwoman Jane Powell; Mayor Ted Kirschner of Colma; Gladys Hansen, archivist of San Francisco; Irene Neasham, San Mateo County Historical Association; Col. Y. Spalding, historian of the Presidio; Gay Kochmech, area v.p. of the California Conference of Historical Societies; Gene Fambrini of E Clampus Vitus; and Anna Kahle, 94-year old pioneer resident of Colma.

A rousing rendition of San Francisco was sung by the assemblage, which had been reminded that Clark Gable, in the movie San Francisco, had asked what a wagon driver was doing. The reply was "We're goin' to Daly City to get milk for the kiddies!" Daly City didn't exist in 1906, but that's okay.

There was a sidebar to the topic of Earthquake Houses on the Today show, with host Bryant Gumbel, shown on KRON some days later. Filmed at the Presidio, there were good shots of both interiors and exteriors of the two houses behind the museum. And, at the Daly City Library there is a new book called Cottages, which has three pages devoted to Jane Cryan and her earthquake houses!

The San Mateo County Historical Association has asked their members and friends to submit first-person notations of their experiences during October 17th's adventures. One beautiful letter was shared at the meeting, from South San Francisco's poetess Emilia Tardito Salvo.

Rounding out a very jolly evening were the lavish refreshments, displayed and served by Mary Hutchings and her most pleasant crew, Marilyn Olcese, George Gaggero and Bob Williams. Contributions of goodies were received from Eileen Ford, Mary Redfearn, Frances Windhurst, Ford Baron, Fran Kelly and Bianca Caserza. Many thanks to all the very helpers!

Helping with the raffle were our fine ticket-sellers Aida and Leroy Larsen, so that a pleasant prize packet of Daly City stationery, a copy of Bunny Gillespie's DC Trivia book, and a membership badge for the Guild could be presented.

Leroy and Aida Larsen have been so helpful in providing our computerized address labels and lists of members and their membership status. Besides that, they have been very diligent in selling raffle tickets, assisted by Dorothy Gorry.

Having friends at City Hall is very comforting. And, we must not forget the wonderful cooperation of Daly City's Recreation and Parks Department, who provide free use of the Doelger Center Multi-Use Room for four of our five yearly meetings, and of Colma Township who hosts our annual members' meeting each January.





WOULD YOU LIKE A BADGE?


Membership badges of the Guild are available from Ken Gillespie, who purchased a button-making machine, and has been having lots of fun making individual buttons for particular projects.




