SAN BRUNO MOUNTAIN HISTORY BY NEIL FAHY, MARCH 20TH

Our next History Guild meeting will be at 7:30 p.m., MARCH 20th, at the DOELGER CENTER. There will be a special presentation by a very special chap, Neil Fahy, eminent geologist, geographer, historian, lecturer, and Vice-President of our Guild.

Neil, who has spoken on many subjects to us, will present "THE HISTORY OF SAN BRUNO MOUNTAIN", including portions of his extensive research on the flora, fauna and geologic structure of of our easterly landmark.

The mountain was named by Portola Expendition soldier Bruno Hecata, for his patron saint a year following the climb in 1769 to watch a sunrise from its 1,314' crest.





2ND D.C. CITY HALL RAZED



Daly City's second City Hall, at 75 Wellington Ave., top of the hill, is no more! The art-deco building, which served as the seat of government for 28 years, was demolished recently, its hilltop site to be occupied, presumably, by condominium residences.

News of its demolition came as quite a surprise to **Ken and Bunny Gillespie**, who, wearing their hats as DC's official Historians, had been promised notification by the purchaser (and others) of the timing of the wrecking.

Their purpose was to take pictures of the process for the record, and, hopefully to salvage two particular items for the collection: the plaque on the doorstep, and one of the basrelief bears which decorated the parapet of the building.

We understand that the plaque, placed by the Native Sons of the Golden West, has been retained, but the bears are busted. This is sad, since we had been given hope that we could salvage one...even offered the services of concrete sawing by a pair of our members. All we needed was a little _____otification, a phone call. But...nada. Too bad, too bad. A landmark building was destroyed, and the Daly City Record was not even notified, either.

INTO THE CRYSTAL BALL???

Musings on the future...It's very possible that 1991, which has started cataclysmically with a major war and a major national financial recession, might see the establishment of a minimuseum for use by our communities.

The collection at Serramonte Library, mainly photographs, but increasingly of pamphlets, letters, journals, and artifacts, is not available to the general public, save through the library staff and Guild oversight.

But, we hope that, perhaps this year, a start can be made on the creation of a display area where students and the public can see some of the pictures and documents that are part of our communities' historic tapestry. CONTRIBUTIONS RECEIVED

Contributions to the collection have been made by Garden Village resident Rich Blackburn, who presented three vintage maps of Westlake and Daly City, which give good info as to businesses extant in DC in the mid-Fifties. Also, noted transportation historian, and member, Ted Wurm, forwarded a copy of an SF Chronicle article, May 20, 1920, headlined "San Mateo 'Sub' Runs Over Dynamte", a depiction of how a suburban streetcar detonated a stick of dynamite in Daly City. A sack, with 50 sticks in it, had been placed on the running board of an automobile, racing toward South San Francisco with an injured pedestrian.

The pedestrian had been carrying a sack of dynamite (unknown to the motorist) and the sack was dislodged in DC when the car bumped over the streetcar tracks. One of the wheels hit the sack and one of the sticks exploded, cracking the wheel and smashing nearby windows. Passengers and crew were unable to credit their eyes when they opened the sack and saw 50 unexploded sticks of dynamite!

Irene Dalton of Palo Alto has sent us four pictures of a 1931 parade in Los Angeles, featuring SF mayor James Rolph and Daly City's El Carmelo Parlor 256 of the Native Sons of the Golden West, and a business card, 1926 of the Daly City Record.
