Guild director Ted Babow will preside over the materials, which must be picked up at the end of the meeting.

The Western dress is encouraged as a prelude to the Cow Palace's hosting of the Grand National Rodeo, Horse and Stock Show, October 29-Nov. 7th, when top cowboys and cowgirls compete for points and cash in the semi-finals of year-round rodeo trials.

May 19th surely seems a long time the date of our meeting on the Ohlow Indians, as presented by Betsy Bogel, costumed and painted, and most effective in her depiction of the life of the late 18th century inhabitants of our North County area.

Betsy, who visits many schools to tell about the Ohlones, brought a full quiver of information and artifacts on behalf of the San Mateo County Historical Association with flair and enthusiasm. Expert in her craft, she wove a tapestry of the kindly, nonaggressive peoples who hunted only for food, picked only what they needed, and lived abundantly...before others moved into their well-watered, benificent areas.

A good crowd was on hand for the evening, although there was a conflicting t.v. program, Unsolved Mysteries, which that evening was showing the segment about the U.S. Navy blimp L-8, and its drifting to a crash landing in Daly City, its two-man crew missing.

It was time for election of officers of our Guild, and the Nominating Committee, chaired by Jane Powell, presented the slate of nominees, who were elected to the next one-year term. The names are on the last page of the Tattler, the same volunteers who have led the Guild over the years. We wish them well in this new Guild year!

Treasurer Roz Babow gave her yearend report, showing that the Guild, in spite of the lowest dues structure of any comparable organization, is in good fiscal shape. 1992 was the year of the greatest cash outlay spending over two thousand dollars on the display cases and equipment for the Mini-Museum.

Our wonderful friend and member John Olcese contributed six beautiful plants for the raffle, and we used the final \$20 gift certificate at Safeway, donated by the wonderful folks at the Cypress Lawn Memorial Park.

The meeting concluded with tasty refreshments, provided by Eileen Ford, Helene Ramirez, May Truscott, Helen Nelson, Marian Rochetta and Carolyn Damonte, and served with great flair by Mary Hutchings, Marilyn Olcese and Bob & Enid Williams.

Our Guild will be represented at Victorian Days in the Park once again. The two-day event, held in San Mateo's Central Park, is sponsored by the San Mateo County Historical Association, and will embrace the weekend of August 22-23, from 10:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.

There is a History Row, where local community history groups, such as ours, have an exhibit, displays, and the great opportunity to chat with the passing thousands of attendees at fair. Admission is FREE; there will be over 125 arts, crafts and food booths, stage entertainment, sports events and Civil War musters, fashion shows and the Nickelodeon Theater, where history organizations present short (½ hr. max.) programs about their particular locales.

M & S BELLI STORE IN COLMA


The Guild has gratefully received a fine photo of the Colma pioneer store M & S Belli, constructed on San Pedro near Market St. in 1895. The owners were Manueto and Silvio Belli, who married Ernesta Bini and Rose Bacigalupi. General merchandise was sold, foodstuff, household items, small farm implements and clothing, and hay, coal and grain was stored in a large barn behind the store.

Closest to Mission Street was a ir where funeral corteges would stop to water their horses, and others of great thirst on the way to the cemeteries.

Following the 1906 earthquake, the building was taken over by the militia in order to parcel out food to refugees from S.F.

The original building was torn down in 1970 after being used for a number of purposes. We are indebted to Robert Belli of Pacifica for his contribution of the picture for reproduction and the information noted, and also for his donation of two great framed pictures which hung in the bar during its entire existence.
