A team of knowledgeable consultants was present, under the invitation of Director of Library Services Linda Saltzer.

Of particular interest to us was the consideration of the **John Daly Library**, at the top-of-the-hill, built more than 70 years ago, a gift to the people of the small community by John Daly and John Marchbank.

The site has almost no room for needed expansion, and the general consensus was that a move to another location on Bepler Hill, where the City owns the old Post Office building and there are parking facilities, or a move south to the area of the War Memorial Building would be better.
