Often depending on the inclusion in the Pink Section of the Chronicle, attendance fluctuates from week to week, but the library patrons who see the signs upstairs are always warmly greeted by the Guild staffers.

Most of the displays are self-explanatory, and to introduce DC/Colma history is very rewarding. Don Manning has been coming quite regularly, and his local background is invaluable in producing answers to visitors' queries that other staffers don't have.

Sign up for a stint at the Mini-Museum; educational, chatty, and lots of fun. The two weeks before Christmas brought out 24 and 19 visitors during the 1½ hours we were open. Try it, YOU'LL LIKE IT!



Our November 16th meeting was a real smasheroo, concentrating on the Daly City homefront during the Second World War. Using bound volumes of the Daly City Record, slides were taken of activities depicted in the papers, and a script was devised by Bunny Gillespie and read by Bunny and Ken.

Adding to the interest were tables of military equipment from a number of members, souvenirs, badges, scrapbooks, medals, etc. There were several members present who had been included in the script, since the stories of going into the service, sending letters

home, sometimes getting wounded or being decorated for heroism had been printed in the Record.

It got tearful on occasion when notification would be printed of a G.I. killed overseas. The various campaigns were depicted, the progress of the war.

Among the souvenirs brought for display were Pat Hatfield's huge wad of tinfoil, saved for turn-in; Max Ramos's three scrapbooks of the Pacific war; Richard Hill's four rifles, covering several conflicts; John Owen's pristine veterans' organization flags; Lou Craviotto's campaign ribbons and medals; Ken Gillespie's Signalman semaphore flags.

Of special interest were 13 beautiful pictures of World War II aircraft, brought and displayed by our Parks & Rec friend Gabe Goulart. The pictures showed the planes in particular activiand were signed by certain participants in the combat situations.

Among those pictured or mentioned during the program, and in the audience were H.H. Smith, Jr., former DC Councilman, Bianca Caserza, shown in her gradation picture of 1944 from Jeff Hi, and Lou Craviotto, whose adventures in the ETO were well-chronicled in the Record.

Rod Pulsipher videotaped the proceedings for the tape library. We do appreciate his artistry.
