All Hail Emperor Norton, September 18th Meeting

A JOURNEY TO THE IMAGINARY EMPIRE OF NORTON I will be the topic for our September 18th meeting of the Guild, 7:30 pm, at Doelger Center.

Joshua Norton was a self-proclaimed "Emperor of the United States and Protector of Mexico," who lost a fortune and his mind following rice speculation in gold-rush San Francisco. He disappeared for several years and emerged in 1859 a royal personage, creating an imaginary monarchy, distributing money, all within the benevolence of a tolerating San Francisco population.


The story of this likeable nut, who was taken to San Francisco's heart, will be recounted by Robert Chandler, PhD Wells Fargo Bank assistant v.p. in charge of historical services.

The north peninsula connection is the interment of Norton in Woodlawn Cemetery, a hoot and a holler from the graves of the John Daly family. Members of the Yerba Buena Chapter of E Clampus Vitus, a western cultural and other social interaction society, make a pilgrimage to Norton's grave each January. "Clampers," who wear red shirts and black vests, have been invited to our Norton program on the 18th.

Dr. Bob Chandler has spoken to the Guild before, most recently on the Broderick-Terry Duel. He received his doctorate in 1978 from UC Riverside, for a dissertation on "The Press and Civil Liberties in California during the Civil War, 1861-1865." Since that time he has been the senior researcher for Historical Services, Wells Fargo Bank, and has written some 30 articles on Wells Fargo and the Civil War in California.

Merry Month of May Was Merry, Indeed!

Our May meeting was a real doozy! It could have been nothing less, with four beautiful former Miss Daly City



queens present to reminisce over the glory days of their reigns, and former '49-er Hall of Fame tackle and mayor of Daly City Bob St. Clair down from Petaluma to hearken to his twin careers as football star and public servant.

Program Chair Bunny Gillespie had worked for many months on the gathering of as many former Miss Daly City winners as she could. The contests were sponsored by the Daly City/Colma Chamber of Commerce, who supplied scrapbooks and memorabilia that were very helpful in finding the former queens.

Bunny got in contact with a dozen former winners, who lived in as many different cities. Four of them were able to be present, bringing their scrapbooks, tiaras, sashes, trophies, and wonderful stories of their campaigns and year of reign.

Acting as spokesperson for the group was Lynette Fishel, 1961, who had an especially busy year, since it embraced the 50th anniversary of the founding of the city of Daly City, with attendant parties, dances, parades, etc.

She was re-introduced to former DC mayor Bob St. Clair, who had awarded her crown in 1961. St. Clair gave a few delightful remarks about being in politics and a football player at the same time, pointing out how the City Council meetings fell on Monday nights, when his aching muscles were at their sorest from the previous day's game.

Dianne Wagner, Miss DC 1971, who went on to become Miss California in 1972, and who competed in the Miss America pageant that year, Dianne Albee, Miss DC 1976, and Dorothy Barragan, Miss DC 1978, spoke of the great sense of accomplishment and responsibility that the Miss Daly City contests had afforded them during and following the years of their participation.

Of great interest was the use of a scrapbook on display sent for the occasion by Caroline Rickenbacher, Miss DC of 1969.

Kicking off the Miss DC portion of the program was a sing-along medley of songs in tribute to the loveliness of women in general, with the Mitch Miller singers and lyrics on slides.

It was time for the report of the Nominating Committee, chaired by former mayor and councilwoman Jane Powell. The current slate of officers and directors had been polled and agreed to be re-nominated for the ensuing year, with the exception of long-time vice president Neil Fahy, who indicated that he didn't wish to run again. The committee recommended Russ Brabec for the post. The slate was elected and installed for the term June 1, 1996 through May 31, 1997.

Neil Fahy's service to the Guild was commented upon by president Ken, who presented Neil with a Certificate of Appreciation

Councilwoman Helen Fisicaro, Pat Hatfield, president of the Colma Historical Society, Mary Brodzin, former Colma councilwoman, represented our neighboring city Colma, while Carol Klatt, DC councilwoman, and Bill Schumacher, former mayor and councilman of DC, were also present.

Gateway Festival A Winner

The Fifth Annual GATEWAY FESTIVAL was held on the parking lot of the Serra Bowl last June 1-2. The Festival was held in partnership with the Kops and Kids bowling weekend, where youngsters signed up to bowl with policemen and policewomen from North Peninsula communities.

With benevolent weather and a good assortment of booths for food, gifts, crafts and community organizations, the weekend fair was a very pleasant affair, and our History Guild booth was a good centerpiece, right alongside that of the Colma Historical Association.

Colma Gets Loving Cup

The Colma Historical Association celebrated its 3RD ANNIVERSARY at Colma Town Hall recently. A presentation was made to their museum collection of a large silver loving cup, engraved to the "Colma Rolph Club," which apparently referred to the campaign of Governor Jimmy Rolph in the early 1930's. The date on the cup was May 2, 1931.

A representative of the S.F. Police Athletic Club gave the cup to Pat Hatfield, president of the Colma Historical Association, hoping that more information on its circumstance would surface soon. Well, we looked in our bound volume of the Daly City Record for May 1931, and guess what! There was a six inch story for May 8, 1931, telling of

the presentation of a silver loving cup to Colma for turning out more votes than any other Rolph Club in the recent election. A party was held at Colombo Hall, with 500 in attendance. See how it pays not to throw out anything that refers to our communities???
