After many years with the San Mateo Times group of newspapers, Shirley and Michael are now with the Peninsula Independent, their full-page stories appearing under the title "Now and Again."

L-8 Model Well Underway

When we asked in the January Tattler for a volunteer artist to assemble and complete a small model of a WW II blimp to resemble our famous Daly City Unsolved Mystery blimp that fell on Bellevue Avenue in August of 1942 with its 2-officer crew missing, we received an immediate response from member Col. Bill Wade, who has the project well in hand at his Westlake workshop.

An experienced model maker, Bill brought the assembled blimp to the Mini-Museum recently to see the area of display that will show off the finished project. It will be placed in one of the illuminated showcases, near some mounted fragments of the actual L-8 that are currently shown.

Seven different colors of paint were purchased by Bill to recreate the way the blimp looked back in 1942. We thank the good Colonel for his enthusiasm and craftsmanship.

Incidentally, the Mini-Museum docent staff, Walt Schultz, Don Manning, Collins Orton and Dick Larsen, all WW II vets, examined the blimp and gave Bill's assembly a prompt nod of approval!

New Storage Area in Use

Since there is no storage space at the Mini-Museum at Serramonte Library that isn't being used, as bulky items have been received for the collection much of it has been placed in the Gillespie basement. Items such as display racks, the tent canopy, table, easels, mannequin forms for clothing, etc. grew and grew and grew.

We investigated professional storing locally, but the cost would have been prohibitive, and then we received the offer of a small, but adequate storage space in a building that was available through director Marilyn Olcese. And, through the generosity of member Don Manning and his trusty pick-up truck, we were able to deliver the stuff to its new storage spot, which will be just right for withdrawals for use at Gateway Festival, Westlake shows, and Victorian Days in the Park.

Many thanks to Marilyn for the use of the safe, dry and accessible location! Now, all we need is the use of the John Daly Library at the top of the hill as a future museum.

History Guild to Enter Historic Preservation Program

Our Guild has received an invitation from the State of California to participate in the Governor's Historic Preservation Awards program, a process wherein interested parties can submit a nomination for inclusion.

The eligibility factor reads as follows:

Any group, organization, state or local agency involved in historic preservation is eligible to receive the Governor's Historic Preservation Award. The nomination must be made by a person or persons outside the nominated organization.

With the cooperation of our Daly City Mayor Carol Klatt, we will submit shortly our application on behalf of the Mini-Museum, which falls within the project timespan of 5 years since inception.

Certain items must be submitted: A typed statement, 300 words or less, Black and white photos, slides, newspaper items, supplementary data. The above include before and after pictures or documents, all of which we have kept in the files since the original concept of the Mini-Museum some $4\frac{1}{2}$ years ago.
