The day is Sunday, January 18th, the place is the Colma Town Hall, the function is the annual Guild Birthday Bash, the hours are 2-4 pm.



Almost all of the 150 chairs set up for the November meeting were occupied by an enthusiastic gathering of members and friends, who recollected with exquisite detail much of their lives in the Colma/Daly City area as participants in, or neighbors to, the raising of pigs for profit.

Twenty-one individuals who had been noted as former hog ranchers were invited to the meeting and several joined in a panel discussion at the mik These included Al Arata, Tom Callan, Vincent Cilia, Orlando Cortopassi, Al Sereni, Marianno Petroni, and Patricia DalPorto.

Flanked by intriguing hog ranch pictures which had been supplied by Marilyn Olcese, the veteran hog hustlers gave graphic descriptions of the economics and logistics of the business, the sources of swill for feed, the health and nurture of the hogs, the competition among the farmers, the oh so hard work involved, and the gradual changes that came about as subdivisions pushed the porkers away from the land.

It was great fun to see a group of enthusiastic hog fanciers huddled over an enlarged map of the Daly City/Colma area, which had been brought by Director Russ Brabec, outlining former hog raising boundaries and attaching identification labels. Lou Craviotto and Frank Maffei were especially busy.

It was a splendid evening of "I was there" information, and the jam-packed meeting was a most rewarding experience for all.

The "Do's" of Dues!

You will notice that this **Tattler** includes the annual dues information, the card for category of membership, and the return envelope for mailing.

Our dues structure is minimal, compared to similar history-related groups, and often does not cover the cost of printing and postage. The motto of our **Guild** and a logo appear on a flyer that we distribute at the Mini-Museum and any public function, as seen above.

It's interesting to look through the binder of Secretary Bunny Gillespie to see what's been ongoing since the first program back in February of 1982. There was only a steering committee that worked together with grant-subsidized employee who put out a city-wide newsletter on behalf of the newborn History, Arts and Science Commission. That lasted until the grant monies ran out, and the Guild became an self-dependent entity, with by-laws and elected officers in 1986.

Over the years there have been 82 separate subject evenings, besides the activities at Victorian Days in the Park, street fairs such as the Gateway Festival, Westlake festival days, etc., at which the **Guild** has presented information booths.

The Mini-Museum was dedicated in the Serramonte Library in September of 1992, and has been in operation each Tuesday afternoon that the Library is open, always with a staff that includes the following faithful: Dick Larsen and friend Bernice, Collins Orton, Don Manning, Walter Schultz, Bunny and Ken Gillespie.
