
HISTORY GUILD EVENING WILL SALUTE LOCAL MERCHANTS

Michael J. Markovich, president of the Daly City Mission Merchants Assn., will be the featured speaker at the Guild's Wednesday, Nov. 21, 7:30p.m. "History Evening". He will focus on unique aspects of the business community that has clustered along historic Mission Street since the middle of the 19th Century. Hundreds of diverse businesses have served Daly City over the years. Old-timers still refer to Mission Street's enterprises as their "Miracle Mile". (At this writing, we're not sure if he'll have go-with photo slides, but we hope so.) For the program, the Guild will happily return to the recently-renovated multi-use room at Doelger Center, 101 Lake Merced Blvd., DC.

Mike's father, Pete Markovich, was among the "movers and shakers" of Daly City community life for many years. He was a founder of the DC/C Chamber of Commerce. The family insurance business has been in operation on Mission Street since 1945. The firm is a charter member of Mission Merchants, as well as the Chamber

Markovich, affectionately known as "Mike", is a member of the History Guild and a third-generation Daly City resident, with direct ties to the pioneer Markovich family that has resided here since 1911. The family home, built in 1930, is currently occupied by Mike's cousin, Ray Wille, also a member of the Guild. Active in many community projects and organizations, Mike has headed the family business since 1986.

Another outstanding program on local history was presented Sept. 26 in the Parish Hall of Holy Angels Church on San Pedro Road as a trio of highly knowledgeable History Guild ladies took to the microphone to share their unique insight on several phases of the Church. A near-capacity crowd was on hand to hear the presentation.

Marilyn Olcese, member Bianca Caserza led off
the program with the history of the building in
which we were meeting, as well as historical notes
reflecting the Century-plus years since the pioneer
church was dedicated in 1867, and when the pastor
arrived for worship via horseback.

Julia Padreddii spoke from personal experience and dedication to many of the ongoing organizations of Holy Angels, and (last but not least) Jean Gallagher recalled her years as part of the Holy Angels School student body.
