<u>DC Water Department Woes</u> & Wonders at Nov. 19 Meeting


Patrick Sweetland, Director of Water and Water Resources for the City of Daly City, will be the guest speaker for the Wednesday, Nov. 19, 7:30 p.m. meeting of the Guild. As usual, the program will be presented in the multi-use room at the Doelger Center, 101 Lake Merced Blvd.

Patrick agreed to be our speaker some months ago. When phoned last month to confirm that agreement, he enthusiastically responded "I'll be there, unless Hell or High Water keeps me away." Under Patrick's able administration, neither of those probems should crop up to keep him from us.

On display that evening will be several rare and wonderful photos dating back to the time just after DC's incorporation, 1911, when city officials tested the power of the newly installed water system. They are part of the Guild's archival collection.

Terry Walks Away, Again, From Historic in DC Park

The re-enactment of the Broderick-Terry Duel hosted by the Guild for the benefit of the San Mateo County History Buffs on Sunday, Oct. 19, was a wonderful success. Even the weather was cooperative. The <u>Duel Site Park</u> (El Portal at Cliffside) was as beautiful as ever, with grass manicured and trees/shrubs of multi-hued green.



Re-enactors for this most dramatic moment in 1859 local history were Guild members Russ Brabec (Senator Broderick) and Gino Fambrini (Judge Terry). Dr. Robert Chandler of the Wells Fargo Bank history department narrated the event. Very light refreshments were provided by The Guild. Hospitality providers included Marilyn Olcese, Dana Smith, Mark Weinberger, Bunny & Ken Gillespie.

Russ and Gino played their parts to the hilt, dressed to fit their roles, and totally believable.

Russ really thrust himself into the guise of Senator Broderick by raising a full beard for the occasion, and coloring it to match that of the ill-fated politician. Gino's facial-hair, no less-fascinating, is his year-round and ever-distinctive.

Hillside Homeowners' Panel Most Enlightening

Guild thanks to the fine representatives of the Hillside Homeowners Improvement Association that presented a program on the history of their organization at our History Evening in September. The program was very well received and those not present truly missed an enlightening dissertation. Informative as well as entertaining.

Speaking under the colorful banner of their organization, panelists were Eve Aiello, president, and Richard Rocchetta, corresponding secretary, both of whom have a long association with the HHIA. Both are members of the Guild.

Eve and Richard traced the organization's history from its beginning 47 years ago to the present, touching on such traumatic events as the 1964 fire that destroyed the Hoffman Street horse stables, killing 38 equine beauties. HHIA was instrumental in a movement that brought a more restrictive horse stable ordinance in San Mateo County. A magnificent display of HHIA memorabilia was arrayed along the length of the meeting room and given careful scrutiny by attendees. The Guild is fortunate to have such articulate members as Eve and Richard.

Notes From Here And There

Currently in the Guild's upstairs showcase at Serramonte Library is a new display of Cow Palace memorabilia, which will continue to be viewable through the middle of November. Historically, the Cow Palace is one of Daly City's largest and oldest landmark buildings, dating back to completion just before WWII. After only one Grand National Rodeo & Livestock Exposition in the brand new building, the war happened and the facility was closed to the public and utilized by the US Army. After the war, the "Palace for Cows" reverted to state ownership and use. Photos,

clippings, award ribbons, official badges, etc, are on display in this unique exhibit.

The Cow Palace, a local landmark for over sixty years, is a treasured, long-time, dues-paying member of the Guild.

A Look Backward At 1915-16 Daly City Expenses

Thanks to HG members Frank and Doris Rehe (he's a retired 30-year DC employee), the Guild now treasures a copy of the vintage "Itemized Account showing cost of the DC Municipal Water System, Jan. 31, 1916."

The little 60-page booklet includes listing of \$467.20 in expenses to vote in a bond issue of \$100,000. Cost for installing the system was \$115,239.14, with \$7154.96 drawn from DC's General Fund and \$6219.98 due to Crocker Estate Co. (The booklet will be on display at our November 19 membership meeting.)

Current election officers might take note: Clerks (7), Judges (3), and Inspectors (2), each received \$10. The Election Deputy received \$5 for the day. Typing of

addresses for mailing sample ballots was billed "1/2day @\$3....\$1.50." Postage was \$10.75. Printing of 2675 ballots cost \$19.00. In celebration of the successful campaign, the city spent \$.90 (i.e. ninety cents!!) for "Red Fire" Pyrotechnics.

Daly's Hill was THE place to be that night.
