GUILD'S MEETING TO HOST SMCHA'S MITCH POSTEL

Mitchell P. Postel, President of the San Mateo County Historical Association (SMCHA) will be the Guild's speaker for the Wed., Nov. 15th, 7:30 p.m. "History Evening" in the Doelger Center's multi-use room, 101 Lake Merced Blvd., DC.

Affectionately known as "**Mitch**," the speaker will focus on various events surrounding the 150th anniversary of the founding of San Mateo County with emphasis on the restoration of the historic San Mateo County Courthouse in Redwood City, which houses the SMC history museum. He will also tell of events leading up to the decision to restore the building's original facade.

Mr. Postel, who grew up in San Mateo and attended the college of San Mateo, has been Executive Director for SMCHA since 1984, and has served on various county boards and citizens' committees. He is the author of San Mateo's (city) Centennial History, many historyrelated articles, and seven books, including the upcoming "San Mateo County: a Sesquicentennial History." He holds a BA degree in history from UC Berkeley and an MA in history from UC Santa Barbara. He lives in San Bruno with his wife and son.

Previously, **Mr. Postel** favored the Guild (May 1987) with a talk about "San Mateo County's Storehouse." He also spoke locally when E. Clampus Vitus placed a plaque on the façade of Colma Town Hall.

Your Guild officers and directors, grant advisor, City Historians, and fund-raising committee all met with city officials recently to continue discussions for the transformation of the historic John Daly Library building into the location of our proposed future Daly City History Museum.

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The city has provided a draft of a license agreement for use of the facility. We continue to work with DC Council Members Carol Klatt and Sal Torres, and DC City Manager Pat Martel to complete a document which cements our partnership and benefits all.

Finances permitting, the board may be retaining an architect to create renderings of what a history museum might look like. These would be professional, graphic visuals which would be used for both our grant application and fund raising purposes as we continue to approach businesses and other benefactors in the community.

Appreciating Our Treasures

Thanks to the generosity of John D. Daly and his pal, John W. Marchbank, Daly City acquired the two parcels of land on which the John D. Daly Public Library was constructed. The John Daly branch of the DC Public Library was opened on April 25, 1920. The first Librarian was Luella (Mrs. Robert) Fine (an ominous name for a librarian.) The rock quarry on which the library was built had earlier provided foundation material for SF street car lines. The Guild hopes to use that solidly based building as a permanent Daly City Museum.

In Our Memory

It is with great sadness that we report the passing of Hazel Hill Cargain, a member of the Guild and a pleasant face among "History Evening" attendees. Hazel grew up in Daly City, attended Jefferson Union High School, and rode the old #40 suburban street cars down El Camino. She was the sister of Mary, Lorraine and Ethel and the daughter of Grace and Lesley Hill. Her husband and family are remembered with affection.

Hazel was many times a donor to the Guild's collection of historical items. In 2002, sixty years after the fact, she donated her June 1942 JUHS graduation class photo. In 2004, she donated a 1970 parade photo of her Dad when he carried the Flag and marched with DC's American Legion Post #410 at the Top-of-the-Hill. Thanks Hazel.

Fa. Joe Gordon Responds to September Tattler Item

HG member Joseph A. Gordon grew up in Daly City and was assigned to Our Lady of Mercy parish in the 1970s. He writes: "Let me share a bit of history (re: OLM) that Msgr. Richard W. Power gave me and which I've never seen in print.


In 1953, when John J. Mitty, Roman Catholic Archbishop of San Francisco, decided to establish a parish in the new subdivision known as Westlake, he called **Fa. Power** to be the founding pastor.

Mitty told Power that he intended to call the parish "St. Henry." Therein hangs this little contribution to the Guild file of lore. Mitty had no ulterior motive in the name selection, it was simply an as-yet unused name among many already-taken parish names. As unlikely as it sounds, Dick Power panicked.

"Don't do it, Archbishop," he urged, "for my sake, for the sake of the new parish, and especially for your sake, don't do it. It will forever be seen as crass patronizing of Henry Doelger, the developer of Westlake... Neither you nor I will ever live it down."

Mitty listened and agreed. "What do you suggest?" he asked Power. Dick's response was to suggest something related to Mary (and noting the proximity to Lake Merced)... "Why not "Our Lady of Mercy?" Mitty agreed and the rest, as the saying goes, is history.

Editor's note: Joe Gordon, now with a Southern California parish, recalled the above from a conversation with Dick Power in July 1978, the month and year of Henry Doelger's death in Italy.


