
Greetings from President Mark

I have a couple of significant developments to share with the membership on our plans for a permanent museum in the **John D. Daly Library**. After continuing discussions with the city on the complex details of a long-term agreement, we decided that the responsible action would be to retain an attorney to review the document, explain the various implications to our Board, and advocate on our behalf. We have set a reasonable spending limit of \$3,000 for legal counsel.

After negotiations with the city for a lease agreement, it became evident that we could not meet State Prop. 40 grant criteria for control of the facility. We have decided it would not be prudent to continue with our grant application.

The good news is that we continue working on an agreement for re-use of the library as a Daly City History Museum, and we anticipate a move by summer or fall from the mini-museum. While we will be opening our doors very modestly in the beginning, we remain optimistic that adequate funding will be available in the future. These are indeed exciting times, and the board looks forward to the not too distant future when we will celebrate calling the Top-of-the-Hill home.

LOOKING BACK AT THE YEARS OF '7'

Thanks to Guild member Algis
Ratnikas, creator of an extensive Daly City
Time Line, here are a few of the events of
years ending with "7". Read more at Algis'
internet site at www.timelines.ws:

1777: Priests from Mission Dolores and SF Presidio soldiers, designate the gap between San Bruno Mtn and the Coastside Hills as La Portezuela, later Daly's Hill and the Top of the Hill.

1867: German immigrant John Husing opens a general store on Mission Street around the corner from Joe Hill's store on Old San Pedro Road. Husing's store later became a saloon called "White House Gardens."

1867: A new school is built on two lots donated by Peter Dunks. The site later became Jefferson School Annex.

1877: Dampness and a potato blight in the Colma Hills forces most Irish settlers to flee the area. Garnet Chili potato seeds from Oregon are brought in and thrive. Italians buy into the area, plant artichokes, cabbage and flowers.

1887: Holy Cross Cemetery is consecrated on Mission Road

1907: John Daly sells all but three acres of his 250-acre dairy ranch at San Jose Ave. and Mission Street.

1917: Woodrow Wilson Elementary School is constructed, later rebuilt.

1947: First families move into Broadmoor Village; area voters approve new school taxes.

1957: George McKeon begins Zita Corp. construction of St. Francis Hts.

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1967: DC's new (third) City Hall is dedicated. \$3.5 million!!

1977: DC's History, Arts & Science Commission is organized.

1997: Colma dedicates \$750,000 recreation center on F. Street.
