

CENTENNIAL MEMORIES

The manly art of fisticuffs, i.e. boxing matches, for prestige titles and/or

fighting for prize money was luring fans of the sport to the northern area of San Mateo County in the earliest decade of the 20th Century. Although unincorporated, the entire area was known as Colma.

Open-air bouts at James Coffroth's boxing arena, located only 50 feet south of the SF/ San Mateo County border line, had been attracting very large crowds of onlookers, mostly male, since 1903. It wasn't just the vicarious excitement of watching the manly sport of exchanging punches that drew onlookers. Betting on the outcome of matches encouraged the exchange of large amounts of money. Rewards were high. Placing such bets had been outlawed in San Francisco. Boxing buffs arrived in droves with their wagering money.

"The location," wrote former Daly City librarian Sam Chandler in his book *Gateway to the Peninsula*, "offered secure protection from SF police while operating under San Mateo County regulations." "Training quarters and satellite arenas dotted the whole of northern San Mateo County," Chandler pointed out, among them the former Union Coursing Park on Mission Street, which is now the site of Jefferson High School. Millett's training quarters flourished in Colma. A "well equipped gymnasium" was located near a saloon called The White House.

In October 1909, one of the most anticipated fights ever presented brought worldwide and lasting fame to Colma. The contenders were Stanley Ketchell, then the world middleweight champion, and Jack Johnson, the first African-American world heavyweight champion.

Contender Ketchell, dubbed "The Great White Hope", was knocked out in round twelve, allowing Johnson to retain his title. Flamboyant outside the ring as well as within the squared circle, Johnson was considered the most controversial boxing champion in the history of the sport. Boxing in the Colma area continued until the sport was banned by the State of California in 1915. For years, an organization of former boxers met regularly at the Silver Moon Saloon on School Street. Robert Sheldon Thornton was the first person to settle in Daly City after arriving in San Francisco in 1852 as a 33 year-old with 50 cents in his pocket. He built a thriving blacksmith business. The plow from the Thornton House was rescued by Ken and Bunny Gillespie when his house on Sullivan Avenue was demolished in 1997. It sat in their yard until December 2009, when it was moved to our new museum.

Colma and Vicinity Farming - 1886

Colma, nine miles south of San Francisco, is situated on an eminence about one hundred feet above the level of the Pacific Ocean, on a plat of ground forming a gap between the San Bruno Mountain on the east and the low range of hills on the west, and also forming a water shed, part of the winter's rain running northwest into Lake Merced, which empties into the ocean, the other portion running southwesterly into the bay, making good drainage and a healthy town. The soil is a sandy loam, well adapted to cultivation of all kinds of vegetables. A fine quality of cabbage is raised in large quantities on the low range of hills west of the village and on the land extending over those hills southwest into San Pedro Valley. Lakelets and living springs of water are darted over this hillside land, sufficient in many places for irrigation in the driest seasons. But even where these ponds and springs are not found, the heavy fogs from the ocean, which come in the otherwise dry season, furnish enough moisture, if supplemented by deep cultivation and activity in keeping the weeds down. The vegetable land is cultivated principally by Italians, who are industrious, frugal and the most painstaking cultivators. They have a market house of their own in San Francisco, where they sell their products every week day. Their prices have been, for the several years past, low. Sometimes they get a carload sale to some points East and South where prices and freight leave a margin for their labor. They shipped in February last eleven car loads of cabbages, 206,618 pounds. Low freights east, such as have recently prevailed, would doubtless help to build up a vegetable trade with Eastern cities, to the great advantage of the north end of San Mateo County. About 20,000 acres are cultivated in the San Pedro Valley in all kinds of vegetables. West of Colma, in the low ranges of hills, are about 700 acres also in all kinds of vegetables, cabbage largely predominating. Near the Eleven-Mile House about 200 acres are cultivated as aforesaid. Colma is on the line of the Southern Pacific railway and is also connected with San Francisco by a good wagon road. On a large portion of the land tributary to Colma potatoes of fine quality are cultivated by Americans who are industrious and frugal, and, with the aid of poultry, which thrives well in this climate, get a comfortable living. Experiments in fruit culture have proved successful. Cherries, peaches, plums, currants, gooseberries, apples, strawberries and blackberries are of fine flavor and of good size. The soil and climate are well adapted to nurseries for raising fruit or ornamental trees, or propagating fine flower and roses of all kinds, and in the spring native flowers of varied and vivid colors dot the hills and valleys. Besides the industries mentioned, dairying occupies considerable attention. - R.S. Thornton




Tattler Brings About Reunion after 83 Years
