in front of the hearth. Light refreshments, a variety of cookies and drinks, were provided by the Guild and hosted by Elinor Charleston and Dana Smith.



them on a second hike to Mussel Rock to enjoy a spring walk and observe the tunnel that was created in 1875 by Richard Tobin, a prominent S.F. attorney and banker. Tobin blasted an opening through solid rock to create a tunnel providing a more direct route to his vacation home down the coast. Known as "Tobin's Folly," it was used three times before severe storms caused its

collapse. It was later suspected of being a hiding place for coastal rum-runners during prohibition. See hike information on the back page of this Tattler.

MUSSEL ROCK -THE LEGEND OF THE COYOTE'S WIFE By Dana Smith

Although Mussel Rock was suspected to be the

location of a prehistoric Native American village, there was no clear evidence until the state Department of Transportation and Highways discovered indications of the Ohlone village of Ompuroma while surveying the old Highway 1 area in 1977.

Archaeologists were hired to do a voluntary excavation over a two month period of the site, SMa-72, to recover artifacts before the building of the garbage transfer station. Radiocarbon tests made on obsidian lithic tools indicated that the Mussel Rock site was late prehistoric dating to around 1500 A.D. The village site was unfortunately destroyed after limited, preliminary excavations. Artifacts from the excavation are featured at our Daly City Museum.

Ohlone spiritual beliefs were not recorded in detail by missionaries, but it is believed that they may have practiced a form of shamanism called Kuksu involving elaborate costumed dancing ceremonies common to many Central and Northern California tribes. Historians are reasonably sure that the Ohlone people of San Mateo County believed in creation myths peopled by spirit animals who they impersonated during cult dances. Their myths tell of beings, notably the coyote, the ancestor to the Ohlone, and the eagle and hummingbird. The archeologists of Mussel Rock, Millikin and Clark, speculate that the name Ompuromo may mean "Ocean Flea Place" from the Ohlone dialect word "omux"



meaning ocean, and the word "por" meaning flea. The only known coastal Ohlone creation story tells of the mythical coyote whose wife ran away into the ocean and was transformed into a sand flea. The rock formation at Mussel Rock may represent the coyote and sand flea.

TIMELINES OF HISTORY (ORGANIZING HISTORY: THE BACK STORY)

The Timelines of History project, www.timelines.ws, was first posted to the Internet in 1998. However, the initial conception for the project actually began much earlier.

In 1975 I enrolled at Wayne State Univ. in Detroit, Mich., for a master's degree in Humanities. The program was quite exciting, but I immediately found myself confronted with a large variety of names, dates, events and subjects from around the world. In an effort to organize this information I got hold of a lengthy roll of paper, perhaps 2-3 feet wide, and cut off a section about 15 feet in length. On this I drew a horizontal line and dated the left end at 1000 BC and the right end at 1975. This line was then subdivided into 100 year increments to which I appended names and events along shorter lines 60 degrees above and below the base date line. Names of artists, musicians and writers would go angled on top, while significant events, such as wars and inventions, would go below. This was quite fun and allowed a broad context for individual events. However, after one semester a lot of crowding took place around various periods such as the Golden Age of Greece, the Renaissance, the French Revolution, the Industrial Revolution and WW I - WW II. Multiple erasures soon led to the demise of this paper project.

It was a marvelous learning aid, but the medium was not quite right. "This medium was not the message," but the message was important. Although this was a great, short term, learning experience, over time I grew to realize that it was also much more. During the next 20 years I often thought of this project and tried to conceive of some mechanical means by which it might work. I even considered the "etch-a-sketch" drawing toy as a model, wherein a scroll of history, moved by cranking knobs, would be bound and displayed under a screen. So much information was passing by every day: "Here today gone tomorrow!" But it wasn't really gone. A deep comprehension of current events forming out of the past and in turn forming the architecture of future events grew to have a big impact on me.

In 1976 I left Michigan and after some months of travel settled in California, met my wife-to-be, moved from Chinatown to a house in Bernal Heights and enrolled in the SF School of Electronics and Communications, just as the PC began to make its initial appearance. Over the next 15 years it became clear that the 'etch-a-sketch" device I had dreamed of was now at hand, and I could charge forward on a Timeline of History without worrying about torn paper, messy erasures or running out of space.

By 1995 we were well settled in Daly City and I began building history files. I had recently finished reading "History of Knowledge" by Charles Van Doren (1991), and was very much impressed by the numerous dates attached to significant people and events. My first files were created from material extracted from his book. I did not need to do much picking and choosing. Mr. Van Doren had already done the heavy lifting. My reading now became tied to gathering data. All sorts of magazines, books and newspapers that I devoured became fodder and quickly marked up with no end of yellow magic markers. This however, was very tedious. To enhance the file-building process I discovered a series of "Today in History" files being posted to the new World Wide Web from a number of sources. Every day for the next two years I broke down these "Today" files into their year and geographic components and thus rapidly built a strong backbone for the project. By 1998 I had individual files covering every day of the year, every country of the world, all the U.S., a number of major cities and a variety some special subjects. My universal file went all the way back to the Big Bang.

Posting these files online immediately put me in touch with people from around the world. This was very rewarding and I accepted data contributions as they came in. By happenstance living on the west coast turned out to be an ideal location for this. Every morning as I gathered and summarized the news events of the day as events for much of the rest of world were ending.

Following my retirement in 2007, the TofH project became my main occupation and I began to work on

How this came about will be among a number of subjects to be covered in more detail on May 23, when I will be present a one-hour talk: "Timelines of History" at the newly remodeled SF Merced Library. This library now features a new large screen display for digital images and has Internet access. This will allow a live demonstration and overview of all the features on the TofH web site. A MARCHBANK REEMERGES

In early March, Mr. Ernie Marchbank, of Lakewood, California, contacted the Daly City History Museum. This cordial gentleman is a great-nephew of Daly City businessman, entrepreneur, and philanthropist John William Marchbank. Ernie, though somewhat familiar with his great-uncle's local fame, was mainly interested in his family's origins. As many know, John Marchbank was originally from Canada, where he made his first fortune in the taverns, hotels, and dance halls catering to the mining industry. He then came to the Daly City area and established another fortune through numerous local enterprises.

Through research in the museum's records, we found that John's father, James, was a farmer who had immigrated to Canada in 1825 from Dumfriesshire, Scotland. Dumfriesshire is a county in lowland Scotland that borders with England.

Marchbank had an enormous impact on Daly City, though he is often overshadowed by the fame and achievements of city namesake, John Daly. In the next Tattler, we will revisit the life of Ernie's relative, John W. Marchbank.
