# WOW, LOOK AT THAT BAY!

In November of 1769, while trying to find Monterey, a party of Spanish soldiers, a priest, mule packers and Indians explored along the coast of what is now San Mateo County.


Headed by Don Gaspar de Portola, newly appointed Governor of California, the expedition had missed their target, looking for an enclosed harbor, similar to San Diego's. On a hunting party, Sergeant Jose Francisco Ortega climbed a mountain ridge, and discovered...ta-ra-ta-ra, SAN FRANCIS-CO BAY!

The dramatic story of Portola's expedition will be told by a real expert on the subject, Judge F. Jose de Larios, at our upcoming Doelger Center meeting, 7:30 p.m., March 21st.

Judge de Larios is a retired Judge of the Municipal Court, Northern Judicial District of San Mateo County, 1963-83. An enthusiastic historian, he is the current president of the San Mateo County Historical Association and the Historical Association of South San Francisco.

He is the standing president of the Port lá Expedition Foundation, a director of Los Californianos, and was a key figure in the establishment of the Portolá Expedition monument in Pacifica, a splendid figure of the explorer, facing towards the ridge where S.F. Bay was first sighted.

His credentials stretch from here to Sweeney Ridge, a Stanford grad in law, Field Artillery officer in WW II, lecturer, seminar leader, community figure. We extend a grand welcome to our Portolá Pro, Judge F. Jose de Larios.



# A MONUMENTAL JANUARY MEETING

One hundred and eighteen was the nose count at another standing-room only Birthday Party at Colma Town Hall. Celebrating the Guild's eighth official birthday, the members-only gathering was held on Sunday, January 21, 1990, from 2 to 4 p.m.

Speaker for the afternoon festivity was Elio Fontana, of V. Fontana & Co., who have been in the monument business in Colma since 1921. Elio represents the 5th generation of Fontanas in the stone craft. His son, Mark, now actively leads the company.

Backed by an impressive display of historical and current pictures of granite and marble works, Elio captivated his audience with a splendid depiction of how blocks of stone are translated into living memorials, the only truly lasting testaments to those whom the artistry recalls.

A number of guests were introduced, including host Mayor Ted Kirschner of Colma; Mayor pro-tem A aglia of Daly City, Geno Fambrini, representing E Clampus Vitus, the Gold Rush group which places markers of historical significance throughout the West; JUHSD Trustee Betty Schultz; members of the Fontana family.

Ms. Schultz presented the Guild with a can of Anheuser-Busch water, prepared by the beer company for emerency use following the Oct. 1989 earthquake.

Under the expert direction of Refreshment Committee chairperson Mary. Hutchings, special birthday refreshments were served, finger foods, cookies, and two beautifully decorated birthday cakes. Assisted by Marilyn Olcese, Bob and Enid Williams, Ed and Olive Smith, Jean and John Gallagher, Ann Ingersoll and Lanty Molloy, the committee presented a very tasty table for the attendees.

Much appreciated was the loan of 50 chairs from the City of Daly City. Delivered on Friday, used on Sunday, and picked up on Monday, the chairs augmented Colma's supply. Mayor Ted Kirschner's assistance is gratefully acknowledged.

Staffing the registration table was Roz Babow, membership chair, who received current membership dues, with the able assistance of Yolana Hardiman.

# COLMA TOWN HALL PLAQUE

At the Colma Town Hall early in January there was a presentation made by members of the Yerba Buena Chapter #1, E Clampus Vitus. Each January a pilgrimage is made by members of the pioneer history and fun organization to the grave of their early friend, Joshua Norton, Emperor of the United States, etc.

The presentation was in the form of a commemorative marker, honoring the Township of Colma. Formerly known as Lawndale, and incorporated in 1921,

the .me was changed to Colma to avoid conflict with another community in the state called Lawndale.

A large group of enthusiastic Clampers, with a magnificently strident jazz band, rattled the timbers of Colma Town Hall, as Colma Mayor Ted Kirschner accepted the handsome marble marker on behalf of the community.

California. A \_dw days later she was on her way to Oshkosh, Wisconsin,


