
OHLONE INDIANS ON MAY 19TH

The life and times of the Ohlone Indians will be topic for our next Guild meeting, Wednesday, 7:30 pm, at Doelger Center. An expert in the culture of the Ohlones, Betsy Bogel, will appear in the dress of the Ohlone woman, with facial makeup, artifacts, and a wonderful depiction of what life was like in the small clusters of Indians who populated what is now San Mateo County when the European settlers arrived more than 200 years ago.

Betsy takes her Ohlone story to children of the County's schools on invitation, and gives a vivid portrait of the local Indians as they gathered acorns and nuts, berries, fished the ocean and the bays, hunted small game, and lived very peaceably before outside influences appeared on the scene.

A former schoolteacher, a current D' ctor of the San Mateo County History al Association, creator and chair for 11 years of the History Buffs of SMCHA, Betsy is a charming, humorous, thoroughly-skilled resource of history of our former local inhabitants.

ARRESTING PROGRAM BY SHERIFF'S OFFICE

Our March meeting was a very fine affair, with about 100 members and friends attending. Lieutenant Don Horsley, of the San Mateo County Sheriff's Office, gave a most thorough history of his department, from its origin in the late 1850's, to its current widespread activities throughout the County.

Lt. Horsley brought several photos of previous Sheriffs, and brought the assemblage current information about the new prison facility being built near the County Buildings in Redwood City.

Jane Powell gave her report as chair of the Nominating Committee, that the current officers were will to continue in their posts, and that no one else had indicated a desire to be an elected officer of the Guild.

"UNSOLVED MYSTERIES" FILMS BLIMP STORY FOR MAY 12th!

Watch your TV Guide listing for UNSOLVED MYSTERIES for the week of May 12th. That's the date currently slated for broadcast of the segment on the Mystery of the Ghost Blimp, the airship which drifted over Daly City in August, 1942, to crash-land on Bellevue Avenue.

The gondola was empty, no sign of the two-officer crew which taken the blimp from Treasure Island 4½ hours earlier. There was no sign of any emergency. Nothing was missing that wasn't accounted for...save for the crew!

In April the last of the local filming of the segment was completed, in Oakland and Alameda. Previous work had been done in San Francisco and in Daly City, Treasure Island and Moffett ld. Bunny Gillespie was an eye-wit-

; to the event, and with husband Ken was interviewed on camera. Local shots were taken at Thornton Beach, where blimp first came ashore, and on Bellevue Avenue, where the blimp crashed.

A very realistic gondola, with a part of the blimp's envelope, was constructed locally, and was filmed in several locations, with costumed actors and extras, depicting the strange story of the mystery that still has no end.

How much, if any, of the footage will be used, we know not. But, the episode is fascinating, and what we saw of the filming on the various locations was very thorough, and well-done. In any case, remember to watch the show, 7:00 pm, Wednesday, May 12th, on KRON.

A side-bar to the mystery blimp is the hanging of the commemorative plaque on the inside wall of the War Memorial Building at the top-of-the-hill. The plaque is nicely framed,

in a very visible location, and we do thank Guild member Carol Klatt, who received it on behalf of the Recreation and Parks Dept., and shepherded the installation.

Plans for rerouting the Ocean Shore highway so as to avoid use of the old Ocean Shore Railroad right-of-way over Pedro Mountain were outlined at Redwood City last Monday.

Local news 60 years ago was very much socially-oriented, but international fillers were used liberally, as well as County items. It's interesting to note that the last item is still being discussed, re-routing Highway 1 to avoid Devil's Slide.
