

LOCAL AERIAL HISTORY

1911, Jan 7 - English aviator James Radley operating a French Bleriot airplane performed over South San Francisco, skimmed the West Virginia, the flagship of Rear-Admiral Barry, and checked the time of San Francisco Ferry Tower clock on both sides. 1911, Jan 18 -



Naval aviation was born when pilot Eugene B. Ely flew a Curtis Pusher biplane onto the deck of the USS Pennsylvania in San Francisco Bay. 1912, May 13 - Aviator Roy Francis and artist Phil Rader made a 36 minute flight over San Francisco. 1915, Mar 14 - Lincoln Beachey air dare devil (pictured to the left), plunged into the shallows of San Francisco Bay and was killed as some 50,000 fans watched his performance during the

Panama-Pacific Expo. He is buried in Cypress Lawn Memorial Park in Colma. 1929, Aug. - Motorists crowd onto the new Skyline Boulevard hoping to see the German Graf Zeppelin overhead. The Graf Zeppelin was a passenger-carrying, hydrogen-filled, ridged airship which carried passengers commercially from 1928 to 1937. In August of 1929, the airship began the first ever nonstop flight across the Pacific Ocean on a round the world trip. crossing the coast at San Francisco before landing in Los Angeles. 1942 - Aug 16, The US Navy L-8 patrol blimp crash-landed at 419 Bellevue St., Daly City after drifting in from the ocean. The ship's crew, Lt. Ernest Dewitt Cody (27) and Ensign Charles E. Adams (38), were missing and no trace of them was ever found. 1943, Dec. 5 - A fighter plane on routine flight from Hamilton Field plowed into a vacant home at 73 Alexander Street at full throttle at 9:14 a.m. and exploded. The house was pushed off its foundation and a gas line was broken and ignited. No one was home at the time. The body of the pilot, Second Lieutenant Wallace R. Hopkins aged 20, was lodged on the roof. Of 15 occupants in five of the six houses, none were injured by the barrage of debris and exploding machine gun bullets which tore through walls and roofs. Next door Mr. and Mrs. Udby were in bed when debris ripped the roof off over their bedroom. Across the street, Mr. Kelly said "parts of the plane were everywhere - it looked like the whole block was on fire." A woman ran to her front porch and fainted when she saw a severed hand at her feet. Unofficial reports claim that the plane had collided in mid-air with a second Army fighter plane. A few minutes after the first crash, a second fighter plane rammed into the hills just north of Daly City killing flight officer George Criswell.

BART ARRIVED 40 YEARS AGO

November 5th marks the 40th anniversary of the opening of the Daly City BART station with a monumental traffic jam. At this time in 1973 it was the southern terminus for the West Bay system. The original fare from Daly City to downtown San Francisco was 35 cents. Coinciding with the opening of the Daly City BART Station, Alemany Boulevard west of Junipero Serra Boulevard was widened and renamed John Daly Boulevard. The widening of the street displaced 55 homes. Residents in the area staged a protest at the station opening against redevelopment plans to remove more homes around the BART station. By the end of the month the Daly City Council dropped plans for redevelopment of the residential areas around BART. The 3.6 mile Transbay Tube was still under construction and didn't open until September 1974. (Thanks to Marc Christensen of the META News for contribution of BART history information.)
